Edith Sutterlin: (10:57) Scholastic has a lot too, as you probably already know

Sophie Brookover: (10:57) EnchantedLearning.com is really good.

Sophie Brookover: (10:57) And Pinterest, of course.

Edith Sutterlin: (10:57) each of the publishers

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:57) Thinkfinity and even Facts on File has good video clips sometimes

Edith Sutterlin: (10:57) I do that all the time

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:58) We did a big thing with the Iditarod a few years back for Discover New Trails

Edith Sutterlin: (10:58) Nonfiction is my favorite. go with where I'm traveling too so I can bring back

Edith Sutterlin: (10:58) postcards or little objects

Linda Hoffman: (10:58) Yes! I did a program about Chinese New Year's. It was interactive with videos, we learned some chinese words and did a dance with scarves.

Edith Sutterlin: (10:59) Desert theme, for example from AZ-- so different from AZ

Danielle Kootman: (10:59) Planned a cooking stroytime- measuring, making Confetti Soup for a gift for them to take home- reading Stone Soup

Edith Sutterlin: (10:59) we had a very simple thing for Father's day -- had high school student teach how to tie a tie . Both girls AND boys learned.

elizabeth maggio: (11:00) I do not do many nonfiction programs, but when I do craft programs I display non fiction books about the craft or the holiday we are crafting

Susan Flacks: (11:00) We have a Wierd ience Program for 4 to 6 year olds at 4 pm. For the Suumer we have Weird Science in the Library Garden. We have a librarian who is and excellent gardener and she leads it.

Edith Sutterlin: (11:12) the other staff is assigned to work at other libraries ...

Edith Sutterlin: (11:12) im more worried about the public than my own job.

Dawn Bladzinski: (11:12) Did the closings affect Donna Bode too?

Edith Sutterlin: (11:13) S. Orange, W. Orange, E. Orange not affected; this was strictly in City of Orange.

Dawn Bladzinski: (11:13) I hope your neighboring communitis are welcoming you. Perhaps bus companies could negotiate discounted fares?
