


Picture Show


Baby Bath and Baby

Acorn Boxes


Autumn walks turn up special little treasures. We often come home with our pockets full of acorns, pebbles and maple tree wings. Appreciate nature's tiny gifts by making a special acorn box to house small objects collected on walks. Use two small sections of a paper egg carton to form the top and bottom of the box. Paint the top egg cup brown and the bottom beige. Cut a ½" slit in the bottom of the brown cup and pull a ribbon loop through to form a handle. Knot the ribbon on the inside of the cup. Now place your little treasures in the other cup (the bottom of the box) and glue the top on. Children may








Stuffed Animal Sleepovers


Systematically consider


