


Grounding Assumptions, Part 1

- In libraries, we must constantly re-examine our own practices. Sometimes, we will find that our practices need to change.


Grounding Assumptions, Part 2


- People experience and express their gender and their sexuality in many different ways; we affirm and celebrate those experiences and expressions.
