Sophie Brookover 2: (10:20) Ragini, you'll always be logged in as a guest. Only LLNJ staff & presenters have user accounts in the webinar software. You're here, that's the important thing!

lois gross: (10:21) Are you limited to serving only resident children?

Darby DeCicco: (10:23) What does your playgroup consist of?

Darby DeCicco: (10:24) Thanks :)

Susan Fogarty: (10:24) Do you do playgroup and craft during the same storytime?

Jennifer Schllig: (10:24) We have a light-up starry ceiling in our story room that might be nice for "starry night stories".

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:25) That sounds so pretty!

Jennifer Schllig: (10:25) It is. :-)

Jennifer Neely: (10:25) same here. we don't get the people to come but I think part of the problem on that is we are only open 2 evenings and I only work Monday nights which seems to be very low attendance night

Sandi Cronce: (10:25) What time did you hold this night story time?

Jennifer Neely: (10:26) Im doing this! Summer reading event!

Darby DeCicco: (10:27) I'm planning my first one this summer and I can't wait!

lois gross: (10:27) I've had the same problem trying to do "inclusive" story times with a concerted outreach to kids with disabilities. While it was requested by the community, I end up cancelling more than holding.

Jennifer Schllig: (10:27) I love this!

Kathleen Breitenbach: (10:28) a librarian I heard at a summer reading workshop suggested having kids bring in their "second favorite" teddy bears or stuffed animals for sleepover

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:28) This is so adorable.

Sandi Cronce: (10:28) Applesauce is adorable!

Jennifer Carlin: (10:29) I did this program too and some of the children did not want to leave their animals. Good idea to have some puppets handy

Linda Hoffman: (10:29) I did this too! Extremely successful! When they picked up their animals, we had a scrapbook for each child with pictures. Great fun!

Jennifer Carlin: (10:29) the scrapbook is a great idea!

Eileen Smith: (10:29) Did you give each child a photo when they came back to pick up their stuffed animals?

Sandi Cronce: (10:29) Where did you post the pictures for the kids to see of the sleepover? Album, website, flickr?

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:30) What was Renee's name again so I can check out her special needs ideas?

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:30) Thanks

Mary Repnicki: (10:30) Great idea.

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:30) We sent the kids personalized postcards from their pets with pics and a "diary entry" for their stuffed pets that spend President's Day weekend at the library

Linda Hoffman: (10:31) WE also made paper quilts for the animals to sleep on.

Jennifer Neely: (10:32) you can use a parachute too!

Sandi Cronce: (10:32) We do this and call it Toddler Dance Jam!!!

lois gross: (10:33) A great way to do this is to do "demo" programs with the help of neighborhood movie and yoga studios. I have presenters come about once a quarter to do a model program. The presenter gets (coluntary) names of people who might sign up for classes, and I get a free rprogram.

Kristin Redmond: (10:33) We just did a Dance Party for 3 and under. 1/2 hour long of music and dancing with scarves, shakers etc. It was a blast!

Mary Repnicki: (10:33) I love this program .

Darby DeCicco: (10:33) This might be a silly question...but what do you actually plan to do?

Darby DeCicco: (10:33) Sorry, I'm new to this!

Lina Crowell: (10:33) our toddlers can't get enough of egg shakers!

Mary Repnicki: (10:34) I start my programs with music.

lois gross: (10:34) Have antiseptic wipes available for the egg shakers. They go right in the kids' mouths.

audra bonfiglio 2: (10:34) there is a cd for bean bag songs as well

Darby DeCicco: (10:35) Thanks for all the ideas everyone! We get tons of really little ones in our library and I never know what to do with them

Mary Repnicki: (10:35) I use Old Mc Donald with musical instruments.

Jennifer Carlin: (10:35) what time of day do you do this? the morning?

Sandi Cronce: (10:35) Musical Scarves and Activities by Kimbo? Is that the CD?

Rebecca Crawford: (10:35) we find that singing "clean up ..everybody clean up...put your eggs away" helps!

danielle kootman: (10:35) Meridian Health has two large characters -one is Hopscotch who will come for free to do a healthy movement program.

Jennifer Carlin: (10:36) thanks!

lois gross: (10:36) Really, that is a "train the trainer" program. You're teaching parents and nannies how to work with kids. The big challenge is to ban texting in the room so the adults pay attention.

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:37) I always used Head to Toe. I didn't know there was a big book. Greg and Steve Animal Action CD is great too

Jennifer Carlin: (10:37) Where can I purchase a parachute?

Jennifer Schllig: (10:37) There's an old Sesame Street Bert and Ernie book called "Anyone Can Play" where B and E try different movement games on a rainy day. It might be out of print but if you've got it in your library, it's perfect!

Jennifer Schllig: (10:39) Hmm...duct tape...never thought of that.

Lina Crowell: (10:39) has anyone made egg shakers with plastic easter eggs?

Kathleen Breitenbach: (10:39) duct tape in great patterns :)

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:39) I bought a huge box of brightly colored duct tape from Amazon for teen programming some years ago. 24 colors for less than \$40, I think?

Sira Williams: (10:41) just made maracas for cinco de mayo with plastic eggs (beans inside), two spoons and colorful tape around them. very easy and cute. kids loved it.

lois gross: (10:41) You must have a huge room!

Alicia Abate: (10:41) Oriental Trading will no longer accept a tax exempt form :(

Jennifer Schllig: (10:42) How do you keep Play-Doh from getting the colors all mixed up?

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:43) You can also decide that it doesn't matter that much.

Amanda Spino: (10:43) You can also make homemade playdough in different colors.

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:43) Amanda, yes! My Mom has a great recipe she's been using since the 1970s.

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:44) I'll dig it up & post it.

Jennifer Neely: (10:44) fancy nancy has printables if you google with activities you can do more school age though

Jennifer Schllig: (10:44) When The Ugly Truth came out, I had a book discussion with pizza and gave the kids a chance to make their own illustrated diary pages.

Sandi Cronce: (10:44) We had a Fancy Nancy Tea Party, complete with boas!!!

Jennifer Schllig: (10:44) Olivia rulz!!!

Lina Crowell: (10:44) we've done Fancy Nancy, very popular

Kristin Redmond: (10:45) We've just done Purplicious and Pinkalicious book parties.

Jennifer Neely: (10:45) pinkalicious cupcake decorating !

Jennifer Carlin: (10:45) We had a Fancy Nancy Party too and it was so much fun. We also had an American Girl Tea Party and a picnic.

Jennifer Schllig: (10:45) Boy, these ideas are great--especially since we've got an outdoor garden area with gazebo.

Darby DeCicco: (10:45) Jennifer, that sounds like the perfect spot for a tea party. I'm jealous!

Jennifer Neely: (10:46) i love them but our budget and space constraints do not support the purchase of them.

Dawn Bladzinski: (10:47) Wow, Jennifer starry ceilings and a garden and a gazebo. We are all jealous. Which library?

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:47) When I worked at Camden County, we ONLY purchased pop-ups for storytime & kept them all in the children's office.

Susan Fogarty: (10:47) Do you ask patrons for donations in good condition. We get lots of great books that way.

Jennifer Schllig: (10:47) Max and Ruby also rule!!!

Lina Crowell: (10:47) Friends of the Library are another good source of funds

Sophie Brookover 2: (10:47) You might also try the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation.

Katharina Radcliffe: (10:47) I pull out pop-ups from the donations we receive and keep them for our little reading group

Sheila Watson: (10:48) my local businesses sponsor many of mine

Sharon Vincz: (10:48) Our library summer reading program is sponsored by our local Rotary Club.

Jennifer Schllig: (10:48) Fancy Nancy might fit in nicely with "Dream Big" if you're modifying the theme, as I am, to include all kinds of kids' dreams...of being an explorer or detective or just all-around fancy lady like Nancy.

lois gross: (10:51) This year, I'm going to have an (unrecorded) program for the younger siblings. I will hand out leftover reading logs from last year and if the kids read 10 books with an adult and turn it in, they will get crayons and a little coloring book. I got tired of little sibling meltdowns when they can't sign up for summer reading.

Lina Crowell: (10:52) we include preschoolers in summer reading

Jennifer Schllig: (10:52) We have chalk but watch out for some shades of blue...even a major rainstorm didn't wash it out of the courtyard paving!

lois gross: (10:52) I'm also in the process of writing a blog post for www.metromoms.org talking about families making a "do it yourself" program for younger children so that they don't feel left out.

Rebecca Crawford: (10:52) We have a "Read With Me" club for the pre-readers.

Jennifer Neely: (10:52) we do parking lot art. block off part of the parking lot and let them use the sidewalk chalk to play. it worked really well in the evening too since it's summer and they can stay up and it is light later but also cooler on the pavement.

lois gross: (10:54) I have Reading Dogs and the kids who read to the dogs can count their time toward their final goal.

Kathleen Breitenbach: (10:54) When I did preschool storytime at my last library, I let the kids count storytime books for their summer reading.

Linda Hoffman: (10:54) Story times count. Preschoolers fall into the category of family readers.

Jennifer Carlin: (10:54) We have reading dogs too. Therapy dogs..Kids love it

Sandi Cronce: (10:54) We let our kids read off their fines by reading to our library bird Libby!!!

Jennifer Carlin: (10:54) A library bird, so cute!

Elaine Pollak 2: (10:54) Sandi- awesome idea!

ellen Ryan 2: (10:55) We also have a "Read To Me" program which is very popular. The child can go to the "treasure chest" for a small reward after listening to 12 books. We set a limit of 3 times to the treasure chest during the summer.

Sandi Cronce: (10:56) We do!

Darby DeCicco: (10:56) We do

Elaine Pollak 2: (10:56) We do

Jennifer Carlin: (10:56) We do, as well

Laura Butler: (10:56) We do.

Linda Hoffman: (10:56) We do.

Amanda Spino: (10:56) This year we are giving books as prizes.

Sandi Cronce: (10:56) But cheap, cheap, cheap!!!!

Lina Crowell: (10:56) we do. the kids expect it

Jennifer Schllig: (10:56) I do weekly incentives...there are always tons of McDonald's and Applebee's coupons.

Kellie Large: (10:56) We do not for environmental reasons. We prefer other rewards.

lois gross: (10:56) Bribery is next to Godliness.

Rebecca Crawford: (10:56) We do

Kathleen Breitenbach: (10:56) we give out books as prizes for every so many hours past the goal

Sandi Cronce: (10:56) They are cheap prizes, but the kids don't care!!!!

Susan Fogarty: (10:56) we save some donated books for prizes

Lina Crowell: (10:56) a former director was proud to say that we blatantly bribe kids to read

Jennifer Carlin: (10:56) What kind of prizes do you give older kids?

Jan Murphy 2: (10:57) We had kids read to purchase an animal from Heifer, International (went with last year's program). They weren't quite as philanthropic as we hoped!

Darby DeCicco: (10:57) We do book and the local coupons, and our grand prize is an invitation to our end of summer party. They have to read 25 hours to get invited, so its a nice way to encourage them to keep up with readin gall summer

Susan Fogarty: (10:57) older kids get books or food :) and earn chances to win gift cards at the end

Kristin Redmond: (10:57) We give out donated books that are in very good condition that we don't add to the collection. We also purchase board books to children 3 and under that complete a reading/activity bingo sheet.

Rebecca Crawford: (10:57) Our teens can win gift certificate - Barnes&Noble, iTunes ,etc.

Rebecca Crawford: (10:57) Plus books

Jennifer Carlin: (10:58) We did Barnes and Noble gift cards too.

Lina Crowell: (10:58) older kids like prepackaged snacks for the weekly incentives

Darby DeCicco: (10:58) Did Barnes and Noble donate, or did you purchase the gift cards?

lois gross: (10:58) I got a free Nook Color for buying a lot of non-fiction books. This is my big prize, this year. Other years, I got the local Clearview Cinema to donate tickets and allocate them according to the top number of hours read and two runners up along with an ice cream party for everyone who reads at least 10 hours. Make sure to have a non-lactose ice cream.

Jennifer Carlin: (10:58) We had to purchase the B&N cards

Jennifer Carlin: (10:59) However, Dunkin Donuts gave me free certificats, as well as local businesses

Rebecca Crawford: (10:59) We also purchased the B&N gift cards

Jennifer Neely: (10:59) is anyone else's sound going in and out

Jennifer Schllig: (10:59) For my end-of-summer prizes, I've had the Camden Aquarium donate this year, as well as Storybook Land. The Camden Riversharks have also given vouchers for a certain date's game for the past few summers.

Lina Crowell: (11:00) gift cards for teens

Sandi Cronce: (11:00) We have a Rita's right next door!!!!!!

lois gross: (11:01) I have found that local businesses are less likely to donate coupons since the recession.

Darby DeCicco: (11:01) Lois, I've found the same

Jennifer Neely: (11:01) I'm doing splatter painting outside over Memorial Day when the kids are out of school.

Jennifer Neely: (11:02) oh and spin art is always a big hit

Dawn Bladzinski: (11:02) Could you tell us where to get trucks with special patterns on their tires for painting? I've used regular before but patterns would bring a whole other element of fun.

lois gross: (11:02) At which point I say, "There are no wrong crafts, Mom."

Lina Crowell: (11:02) I've had that same issue with parents who t hink it has to be perfect

Sandi Cronic: (11:02) Anyone found cheap glow in the dark paint?

Susan Fogarty: (11:03) sometimes i show my craft and then put it away so it can't be copied

Rebecca Crawford: (11:03) i don't make a sample so that kids/parents don't try to imitate

lois gross: (11:03) I worked in Florida, for 5 years. There was a library there that did gingerbread houses every year for Christmas. Fathers used to come in with architectural specs for the house.

Jennifer Neely: (11:03) i purchased a small spin art in the bargain bin at Michaels. I think it was \$5.00. They each take a turn dropping their paint and they all just stand around mezmerized watching each one morph.

Lina Crowell: (11:03) I saw some at A.C. Moore for about \$1.69 for 2 oz.

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:03) He is the cutest!

Elaine Pollak 2: (11:04) But we all do have favorites...

Ragini Chaturvedi: (11:04) this is a cute one

Dawn Bladzinski: (11:04) We do the same I Spy Idea on an outdoor walk with pics to check off (birds, stop sign, yellow car, etc.)

Linda Hoffman: (11:05) You can do spin art with a salad spinner as well.

Lina Crowell: (11:05) we have a small stuffed animal or similar that we hide in a different place each week during summer reading. when the kids find it they tell us and they get a sticker to put on thier reading log

Jennifer Carlin: (11:05) We have done this too and the kids love it. We recenlty had a superhero party and hid plastic spiders the kids had to find. We told the children that spiders got loose in the library and they had to be the ones to save us by finding them

Jan Murphy 2: (11:06) We do the same thing, only their name goes in a jar and we pull one name and they win the animal. It's the most popular thing we do.

lois gross: (11:06) We did that one year in Florida. The kids had a ball. I also had an incredibly gifted artist on staff who made a mural with hidden pictures in in and the kids had to find the pictures for prizes.

Jennifer Neely: (11:07) she looks thrilled

Ragini Chaturvedi: (11:07) Mural with hidden pics sure must have been a hit

lois gross: (11:07) HUGE!

Linda Hoffman: (11:07) Lois, the mural is a great idea!

Ragini Chaturvedi: (11:08) I will suggest that for sure

lois gross: (11:08) IF you are ever in fruitland Park, FL, she is working for that library, now. I'msure she's doing something equally inspired. We are only as good as our best library assistant.

Ragini Chaturvedi: (11:09) that is nice

Jan Murphy 2: (11:09) That's so true. Yeah Heidi!!

Sandi Cronce: (11:10) We do fun in the sun with the springlers in the library garden for different ages (preschool, elementary, even tweens).

Sandi Cronce: (11:10) That's sprinklers!

patricia martucci: (11:10) what is bozo's buckets?

Kathleen Breitenbach: (11:11) Bozo was on WGN

Joanne Roukens: (11:11) We had Bozo here too!

Joanne Roukens: (11:11) He scared heck out of me

Joanne Roukens: (11:12) I was so scared of clowns and I'm still not thrilled

Kristin Redmond: (11:12) what type of prizes do you hand out? We do this with tickets and then 3 of tickets can pick a prize.

ellen Ryan 2: (11:13) Does your children's staff also have to do circulation? Our circulation desk takes most of our time which takes away from planning time.

Sandi Cronce: (11:13) Rainbow sunglasses are a big hit here!

Jan Murphy 2: (11:13) Oriental Trading has prepackaged treasure chests that aren't too expensive.

lois gross: (11:13) We do, Ellen, and it is very hard to do that and programs. We also have to do program sign-up while people are throwing books at us to check out and return.

patricia martucci: (11:14) we got a lot of halloween buckets donated to us. do you have any ideas for those?

Sandi Cronce: (11:15) But we only have 1.5 staff members in Children's!

lois gross: (11:15) I'm in a NYC adjacent town (Hoboken) I could do 20 toddler programs every week and fill and have people fighting to get in. The Nannies come armed to kill if they can't get in.

Faith Boyle: (11:16) how do we get the handout?

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:16) I sent it out to everyone this morning. If you don't have it, I'll post it to the page for this webinar!

Kristin Redmond: (11:17) yes, 404

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:17) Weird!

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:17) Sorry about that, folks.

Darby DeCicco: (11:17) it worked for me

Kathleen Breitenbach: (11:17) or just click the link on the slide

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:17) I got the 404, too.

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:18) I created a board, but haven't pinned anything yet.

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:19) I've seen great boards to do with programming for all ages, library decor/re-imagining of space

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:19) Tons of stuff! It's amazing, but also kind of a rabbit hole.

Jan Murphy 2: (11:21) I know it's expensive, but does anyone use ipads during storytime?

Elaine Pollak 2: (11:21) Our baby & toddler programs are always packed!

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:21) Katie, make sure to post your own blog's URL, too!

ellen Ryan 2: (11:22) how do you use an ipad for storytime?

lois gross: (11:22) How would you use I-pad?

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:22) Thanks!

Darby DeCicco: (11:22) you hook the ipad up to a projector or similar item

Darby DeCicco: (11:22) and there are apps for stories that are interactive

Jennifer Neely: (11:22) i use an ipod and speakers and do once a week for 6 weeks with the same songs . We don't play. We just put on the song and either have visuals or hand motions or both. Birth to 5 years. Some songs people should know but also introducing them to ones they dont.

Jan Murphy 2: (11:22) It's been suggested, also, to preload ipadswith different programs and do with the kids and parents in a story time session.

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:23) WE're offering a webinar on using iPads in the children's room next week: <http://librarylinknj.org/content/ipads-children%E2%80%99s-room-everything-you-need-know-launch-ipad-program-your-library>

Jan Murphy 2: (11:23) signed-up!

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:23) Hooray!

Jennifer Neely: (11:23) we sing along with the ipod. we didn't have the funds either. my daughter got a new ipod as a gift so i took her old one! lol

Sandi Cronic: (11:23) Does it come with an iPad Sophie??!! :)

lois gross: (11:24) I did that with a site (the name eludes me at the moment) and I hated it. Even though it was supposed to be interactive, the kids went into TV coma. I had to make up movements for them to do to keep them from zoning. I really think that reading is the point of story time.

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:24) Hah, Sandi. No.

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:24) :-)

Jennifer Neely: (11:25) once every so often we will do one story as a video. 5 minutes scholastic story just as a different thing.

Jennifer Schllig: (11:25) Have to get ready for my own storytime. Thank you very much...it's been quite helpful!!!

Kellie Large: (11:25) Thanks Katie! Great ideas

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:25) You all may be interested in two F2F workshops we're holding with Peggy Wong from Pisctaway PL.

Ragini Chaturvedi: (11:25) Thanks this was very useful.

lois gross: (11:25) And the chat was even more valuable. Thanks everyone.

Sharon Vincz: (11:25) Thank you!

Sophie Brookover 2: (11:25) She's offering workshops on how to develop great PowerPoints to enhance participation in storytimes.
