






#### For my library:

#### Library to hold PRESS CONFERENCE Announcing formation of the "NJHRIC"

The Newark Public Library, along with noted members of the Hispanic community, will hold a press conference (and photo-op) announcing the formation of the New Jersey Hispanic Research and Information Center (NJHRIC).

DATE/TIME: February 7, 2001; 11:00am

LOCATION: The Newark Public Library, Centennial Hall (second floor), 5 Washington Street

Recognizing the importance of the state's large, growing Hispanic community, The Newark Public Library is embarking on a fund-raising campaign to create the NJHRIC. This three-tier project will include:

(1) The continued development of the Sala Hispanomericana, which already has a collection of 37,000 Spanish-language books, magazines, videotapes, and has a bilingual staff

(2) The creation of a research collection aimed at the special needs of students, scholars and other members of the community, making it possible to conduct in-depth research into New Jersey's diverse Hispanic community.

(3) The establishment of an archive focusing on the heritage of New Jersey's Puerto Rican community, the state's largest and longest-established Hispanic group. This would incorporate a vast wealth of materials collected from the community diaries, letters, oral histories (audio tapes and videotapes).



# Literacy For Littles at Moorestown Library



L4L is a passive program that provides access to toys, games, activities, and tips focussed on areas of literacy that are important for school readiness and lifelong learning.

L4L empowers and encourage caregivers and little ones to practice their literacy skills

inside and outside the library. It supports caregivers in being their child's first teacher and making learning fun.

L4L sparks discussions about important skills, from rhyming to recognizing emotions to tooth brushing and healthy eating!
