Access online activities, slide shows, videos, and resources to commemorate the accomplishments of Asian Pacific Islander American WWII war veterans. For all ages.

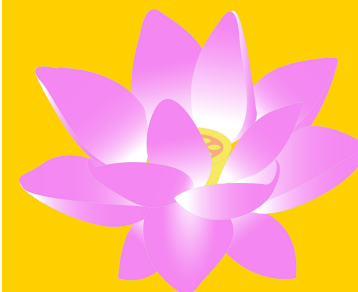

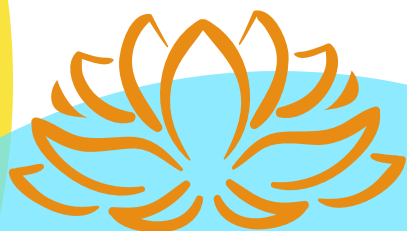
